Chapter Fishing Outing, September 26-29



The LWTU fall outing will be held September 26-29, 2024 in the Westby/Viroqua area. This is a great time of year for fishing terrestrial flies as trout try to fatten up for winter. The Driftless area has hundreds of miles of productive trout waters, and we'll be staying right smack in the middle of it! This outing is a final chance to fish the Driftless before the Wisconsin trout season closes on October 15.

As for previous outings, we will have group accommodations available at Logan Mill Lodge. The lodge owner, Ruth Rupp, has once again given us a discount lodging rate "because you do service work on our trout streams" (her words). Single occupancy accommodations are \$75 per night, and a shared room with two twin beds will be \$100/night split between the two occupants. Space is limited, so if you are interested, contact the Outings Coordinator at outings@leewulfftu.org and reserve a space. Payment for the lodging will be due in advance of the outing, as we need to pay the full amount upon arrival at the lodge.

For those staying at the lodge who wish to partake of shared coffee and cold breakfast supplies (fruit, cereal, pastries, juice, etc), an optional surcharge of \$5 per night will be due along with the lodging payment.

Group dinners will be arranged at the Olde Town supper club as has been the case in the past. When you contact the Outings Coordinator to join the outing group list, please let him know which evenings you would like to have dinner with the other anglers. Each attendee will be responsible for his own dinner expense.

Help Pass Good Samaritan Legislation

Trout Unlimited's restoration specialists know how to leverage public and private dollars to fix degraded streams, creating jobs, and clean water along the way. TU is eager to take on leaking abandoned mines, but under Federal law, groups who have no legal responsibility or connection to an abandoned mine (e.g. Good Samaritans) are deterred from cleaning up these messes due to the incredible liability risks.

We can solve this conundrum by passing legislation that provides bona fide Good Samaritans liability protections... Read on and take action

Protect Illinois Wetlands

The U.S. Supreme Court recently gutted the Clean Water Act, eliminating the protection of many wetlands we rely on for flood control and habitat along major rivers. Now, Illinois wetlands are left vulnerable to developer bulldozers because our state lacks a comprehensive program to protect them. Wetlands act as nature's sponges, improving water quality, providing important flood control, and preserving endangered habitats. Illinois has already lost nearly 90% of our wetlands. In our warming climate and increasing extreme weather, we can't afford to lose any more. Consider asking your legislators to vote 'Yes' and cosponsor SB3669/HB5386, which will protect Illinois wetlands left vulnerable by the US Supreme Court by filling out this form.

Illinois House Bill 1568 Water Recreation Rights

As an angler, you know that the many beautiful streams in Illinois could be much greater recreational assets than they now are. Those streams could provide some of those same memorable, on the water experiences that are available to our neighbors in Wisconsin and

Michigan just outside their back-doors. An Illinois Supreme Court decision recently called on the state legislature to reassert the public right to use state waters. The idea is to pass a new law clarifying and modernizing existing rights for river access. <u>House Bill 1568</u> is the legislation that can get this done. Your help is needed to tell your legislators to support this much needed legislation. Please do it now. <u>Click here to easily take action in under a minute of your time</u>.

Save the Kish

Despite much opposition, the Woodstock City Council recently approved all of the preliminary measures that will allow the Lennar Riverwoods proposed high-density development along the banks of the Kishwaukee River in Woodstock to go forward. Follow this situation here and here. But it's not over until it's over. Bob Olach's Fly of the Month: John Turton's Hawthorn Fly



In his book, Turton had something like 69 different fly dressings, including a dressing called "The Hawthorn Fly."

Turton's original dressing is quite simple:

"4. HACKLE. Hawthorn Fly. For March and April: made with black silk; body, black ostrich's herl; legs, black hen, from neck; wing, lightest or bottom part of a starling's quill feather; sometimes in summer, red legs. In May, use the jay's wing quill feather for wing: this will be the Black Caterpillar Fly. In June, the sea-swallow's feather, for wing, makes it the Black Ant Fly."

The dressing shown below is what I used to tie the flies that are pictured. But with the popularity of pink colored flies, using a pink ostrich herl instead of black might make an "interesting" variation. Also, since the ostrich here can easily be broken by a trout, coating the thread body with head cement (before wrapping the ostrich here) might be a good idea, eh?

DRESSING

Hook: Daiichi #1550 wet fly hook (sizes 14 - 16)

Thread: Black Danville or Uni-Thread 6/0

Body: Black Ostrich Herl

Ribbing: Extra Small Gold Wire (Optional)

Hackle: Black Hen

Wing: Light Starling Quill (slips or bunched and folded)

Outside the shower house at the stream side campground where we usually set up in a beautiful savannah of oaks, willows, and pines, there is a spigot with a hose attached for fishers to wash off their waders and boots. Schnoz and I were there at the last campout when two good-natured fly-fishers from Missouri stopped by in their newer SUV with a long, aluminum rod carrier atop their car. It looked like the rod rack cost more than the rods Schnoz and I used, but their other gear, waders and boots, were well-used, so these were not newbies. My old car was parked next to theirs after a tough day where we caught one fish each. I drove because Schnoz's hearse was out of commission again. This time Schnoz said the atomizer sprang a leak and the flux capacitor had quit flux capacitating.

To trout fishers, a hose for washing boots and waders is at least as good for gathering as a water cooler in a business.

"We heard about this area online," the taller Missouri man said. "Lordy, what beautiful streams there are up here."

"We own them," Schnoz said.

"What?" the shorter one said incredulously.

"Not us personally," I explained. "The law in this state reads that flowing water resources belong to the people, you know, like 'We, the people' and as long as there is access and you stay in the stream, you're not trespassing on someone's land. A lot of farmers cooperate by granting the DNR access and get paid for it. They also get free stream improvement and bank stabilization, even re-construction after a flood sometimes, mostly from money that comes from fishing licenses."

"That's amazing," the tall one said.

"What else have you heard?" I asked. "I wonder what's online."

"Well, the fish are not usually large. A wild twelve-incher is a decent fish. There are a lot of them and they are very skittish. You have to be careful about stalking them."

"That's true," Schnoz said. "We've become experts, and even then..."

I looked at Schnoz and wondered what the hell he was talking about. Most of the fish we catch are because they feel sorry for us, and our flailing and stumbling usually gives them plenty of warning, but they don't seem to care. It's like they tell each other, "Oh, yeah, Grumpy and Schnoz are back. Meh."

"Yeah," said the short guy. "We also heard there's some trout bum up here who has turned a hearse into a fishmobile. Can you imagine?"

"Yeah," Schnoz said. "But I hear he's a nice guy and really knows how to catch trout."

"Out of a hearse?" the short guy said.

"Yes," I said. "He's pretty odd, but I hear he's harmless. And he's old. Real old."

"No, he isn't," Schnoz said. "I hear he's in his prime. There are guys up here who follow him around to see what he does, and they learn a lot."

"I'd like to see that, a row of cars following the hearse to get fishing tips. It would look just like a funeral," said the tall guy.

"I haven't seen anyone following the hearse," I said, "but I hear the guy's friend has started documenting every crazy thing the guy does. I heard the crazy guy wanted to cover all levels of the water column so he tied on a heavy bead head scud and then three droppers with nymphs, then two droppers with emergers, and then on top three more droppers with an Adams, a caddis, and a grasshopper."

"Did it work?" asked the shorter guy.

"For one cast," I said.

"What did he catch?" asked the taller guy.

"Well," I said, "I heard he snagged a rock, two sticks, a leaf that was floating by, and two willow branches hanging over the bank. He lost nine flies in one cast."

I saw that Schnoz was getting angry and red-faced, but before the Missourians could do more than chuckle, another car pulled up at the cleaning station. Ghost Mary and Allie Vargas got out, and we introduced them to the Missourians.

Then Allie, always the friendliest of any camper said, "Hey, Schnoz, you promised me a ride in the hearse. Could we fish together tomorrow?"

The Missourians looked from Schoz to me and then back at Schnoz before laughing out loud.

"What are you talking about?" Schnoz said.

"Your hearse. You promised me a ride at the last outing."

"He can't," I said. "It's in the shop. Something about a leaky atomizer and broken flux capacitor."

The Missourians looked at each other and laughed again.

"Flux capacitor?" the tall one asked. "Um, that ought to be under warranty. Not sure about the atomizer, but I've worked on a lot of cars, and I've never heard of a flux capacitor going out."

"Me neither," said the short guy. "I own a dealership back home, and if a flux capacitor goes out, we'd replace it, no questions asked."

"Really?" I said.

"Sure. Show me a broken flux capacitor on any model of any car and I'll replace it for free, including labor."

Ghost Mary looked like she was about to say something, but then thought better of it.

"You know," said the tall guy, "we made a big mistake. "We're staying at a motel in town, but we should have been camping the whole time out here with y'all. I mean, fishing is fishing, but sometimes that doesn't compare with hanging out with a group like you all have put together. One night around the campfire would have been worth the trip."
